Simon Says, Easy Pieces

page 14

Every square in this quilt would be cut with #8 from our Set B.

Jacks

page 16

Jacks is a very clever idea for using squares folded into triangles (Prairie Points) to create a dimensional pinwheel block. All of the squares can be cut with Template 1, Set A.

Star Light, Star Bright

page 20

There's no template for piece A, the 6 1/2" square. However, piece B would be Template 15, Set C, and piece C

matches Template 2, Set A. You'll love sewing square-within-a-square with no "dog ears" and matching corners on every piece.

P.S. I Love You

page 22

This darling nine patch can be made using strip techniques, but the square in our miniature Set N, Template 79, is the perfect match for piece B. Use Template 1, Set A for piece A and to true up the nine patch blocks.

Tumbling Blocks

page 24

Often called Baby Blocks, this classic quilt is really sweet. Cutting all those diamonds with our Template 44, Set G, is quick work and you'll love the blunt corners.

I Spy Napping Quilt

page 26

Since I love buying novelty prints, I love this quilt! I have made it in **four** hexagon sizes. I measure hexagons by the length of a finished side. Construction-wise, the beauty of this quilt is hexagons with no set-in corners!

For the size shown, 1 1/2" hexagon, use Set H. Piece A is Template 52a and piece B is 53a.

With Set H, you can also make a very large, 3" hexagon, I Spy quilt (suitable for toddlers) using Templates 51 and 52d.

Use Templates 42 and 45 in Set G and you can make the same size quilt with just over half as many pieces. This 2" hexagon is a very popular I Spy size!

And if you need an I Spy quilt for your doll, Set N is the answer! The tiny 3/4" hexagon is perfect.

Tiddly-Winks

page 28

It is unusual, but this graphic quilt combines pieces from our Sets A and B. Piece A is a perfect match for our Set A, Template 1, except you won't fight the dog ears!

Bye Baby Bunting

page 30

Using a smaller square than the one used in Simon Says, this quilt would be cut with Template 1, Set A.

Simple Gifts

page 32

This star variation would be made with Set A. Use Template 5 to cut piece A, Template 6 to cut piece B (without the pesky dog ears) and Template 1 to cut piece C. While we don't have a template for the sashing, we do have a nice trick that could eliminate the seams. Where two piece B triangles are sewn together back-to-back between the points of the star, substitute one triangle 4. Place the arrow of the template on the straight grain.

Pinwheels

page 34

I adore this slightly askew pinwheel quilt. If you own Set C of our templates, you will love making the quilt after you cut it with Templates 16 and 17. The exact size small triangles are cut with no waste and the corners match perfectly. For 8" blocks, use Templates 23 and 24, Set D.

Rock-a-Bye

page 36

Yet another star variation - isn't it wonderful how different they look? Use Template 5 to cut piece A, Template 4 to cut piece B, Template 1 for piece C, and Template 6 for piece D.

You Are My Sunshine

page 38

If you have completely gotten into the habit of using a template to measure strip widths, use square 79 in Set N to measure 1 1/2" strips. Otherwise, I don't recommend anything but Sew-Before-You-Cut strip techniques for Double and Triple Irish Chain quilts.

Ring Around the Rosies

page 42

Get stronger pieced strips when the hypotenuse of all your setting triangles is on the lengthwise grain. Use Set A. Template 5 is piece A. (I can make four patches faster with templates than strips*.) Template 4 is piece B (rotate so the grainline is on the leg). Template 2 is piece C. Use Template 3 to measure the width of the lengthwise strips**, then cut triangles.

Pick Up Sticks

page 44

Another perfect strip technique. If we had a 1 3/4" template, I would recommend it for measuring and cutting strips and the square, but we don't.

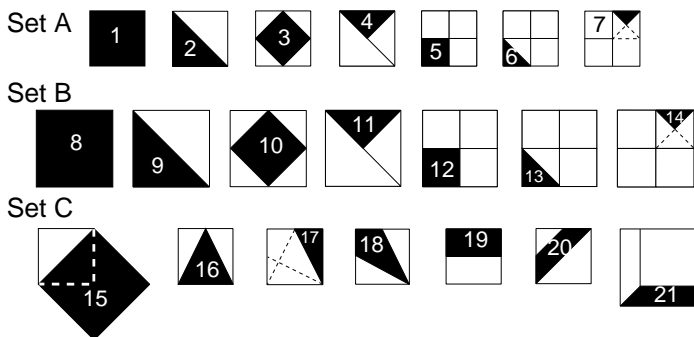
Snips, Snails and Puppy Dog Tails

page 46

Template 12, Set B, is the perfect measuring template for these strips; or, if you own Set D, use Template 25.

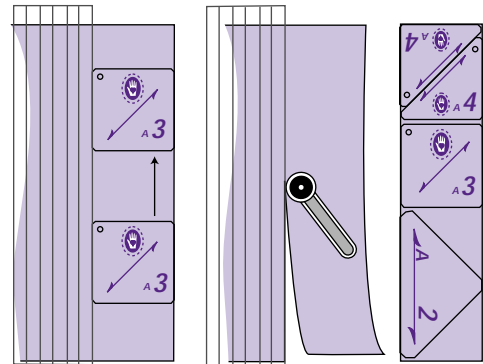

The Best Way to Cut Strips

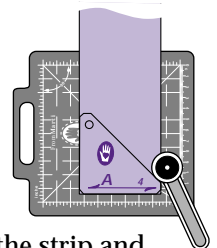


No matter which shapes you are cutting, it is most common to first cut a strip that is the same width as one dimension of the desired piece, then use the template to create the desired shape. It is easy to assume the use of a standard 6" x 24" (15.2 x 61 cm) acrylic ruler to measure and cut strips. Necessity truly is the mother of invention! When the strip widths on Set L came out to sixteenths and thirty-seconds of an inch, it caused an obvious realization - Use the template to measure the width of the strips! The template is the exact size, and it is a measuring tool. It just isn't what we are used to calling a ruler. The technique is shown below, illustrated with templates from Set A. Use squares for measuring strip widths when possible. There is usually a square that is the correct width for each triangle.



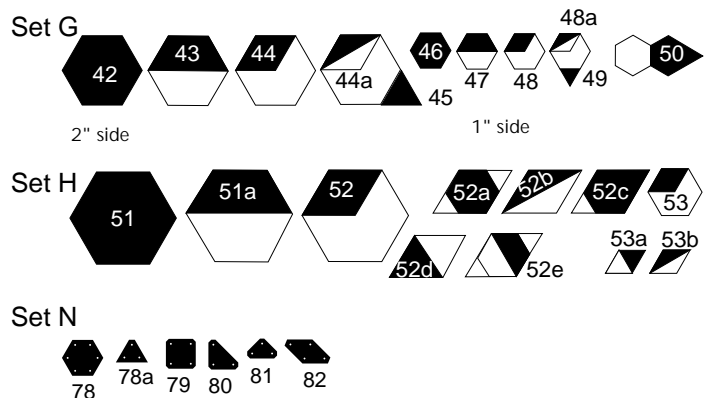
Straighten the edge of the fabric, and align the template with the raw edge. Place your ruler against the template to mark the cutting edge. Slide the template along the raw edge to be sure the ruler is aligned correctly, then remove the template and cut the strip.

- Place the template on the strip to cut the shape. Don't forget to slip a small cutting mat under the strip to rotate as you cut the shapes and nip the corners.



- The desired grainline affects the orientation of a triangle template on the strip and, thus, the width of the strip.
