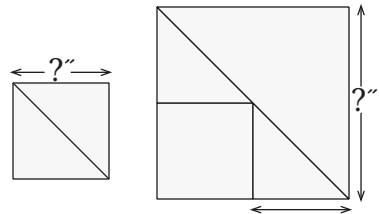




Doing Tricks with the Setting Triangle Ruler

Currently our largest size-specific right triangle template has a $4\frac{3}{4}$ " Set M long leg. You can use the From Marti Michell Setting Triangle Ruler just like a multi-size right triangle ruler but with our special engineered corners.

1. Determine the length of the finished leg of the triangle.
For example:

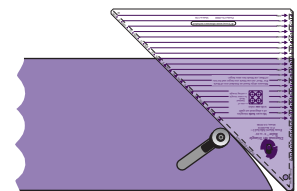
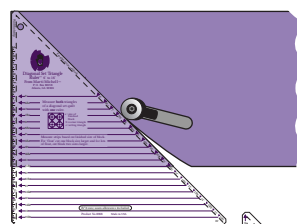


2. Add $\frac{1}{2}$ " to the finished size.

3. Cut a strip that wide.

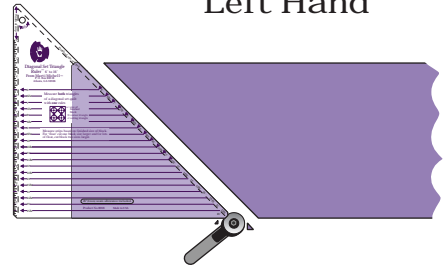
4. Put the top of the ruler at the top edge of the strip and the left edge at trued-up end of the strip and cut. (Lefties will want to start at the right end with the ruler top at the bottom edge.)

Right Hand

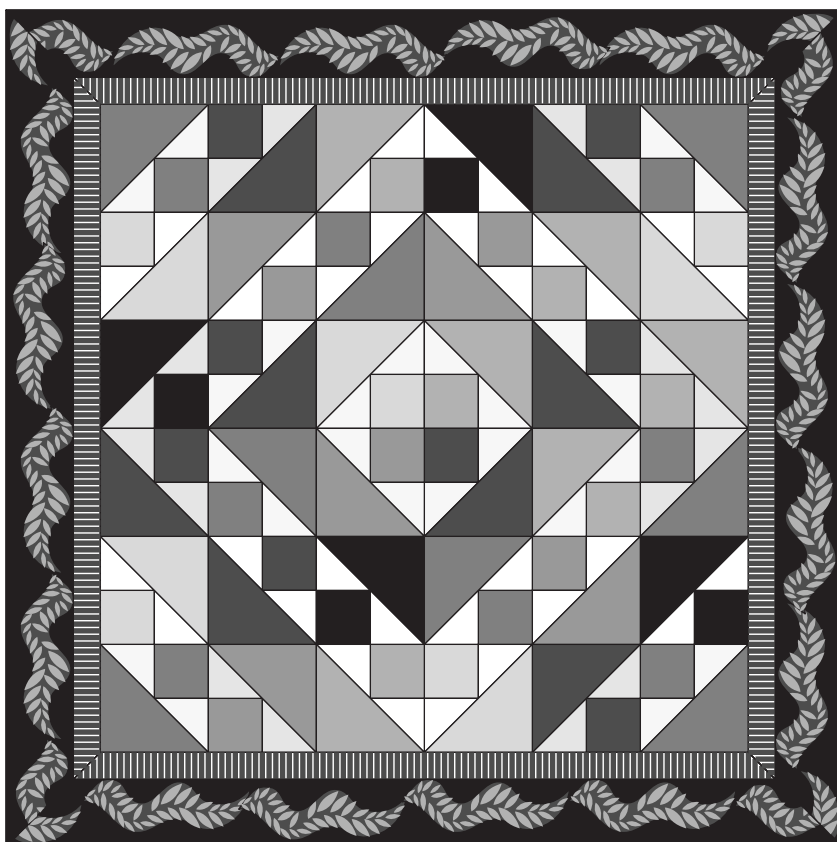


Left Hand

5. Slide strip to the right and slide the ruler up to nip off the corners.



Practice on this Barn Raising Square Dance Quilt!



For a 46" square quilt containing 36 6" squares, we recommend 18 fun prints.

(Selecting a theme like patriotic, Western, Christmas, or "my favorite things" adds to the fun.) To calm things down you'll probably be happiest with only one or just a few similar fabrics for the smaller triangles.

From the 18 10" x 14" prints, cut:

2 - $3\frac{1}{2}$ " squares (Template 1, Set A)

2 - 6" finished right angle triangles

(Cut strip $6\frac{1}{2}$ " and cut 2 triangles as described above.)

(To fussy cut, cut two sides and rotate the ruler to fit for third side.)

From $\frac{1}{2}$ yard background fabric cut:

72 - $3\frac{1}{2}$ " right angle triangles (Template 2, Set A).

All blocks are assembled alike. The fun comes from seeing the design emerge as you rotate and assemble the blocks.

Typical borders are 1" and $3\frac{1}{2}$ " finished.
